"Happy New Year"



As we greet the new year, we take some time to look back at the previous year and see how we've grown, and we set goals for the coming year. This year has seen some amazing growth for us as an organization, and puts us in a position to truly reach new heights in the years to come.

Probably the most tangible and visible growth we have undertaken recently has been the development of our NYC region, Region 9. This year we have seen our NYC colleagues really start to blossom, and I think it's safe to say that band programs in NYC Schools are experiencing a renaissance, and it is beautiful to behold. In addition to some great regional workshops, region 9 members presented an outstanding beginner band session at the NYSSMA winter conference in Rochester. Thank you to Sarah Wolff, Jeff Ball, Jenn Schecter, and Pieter Voorhees for sharing the amazing work they are doing with their students.

In addition to the work done with our NYC colleagues, this year has also seen a tremendous growth in the work of our region representatives and the many regional workshops taking place around the state. I would like to take this time to personally thank each of our nine region representatives for everything they continue to do on behalf of our organization and band programs across the state. A list of all of our region representatives, can be found on our website and if you're not sure which region you're in, there's a great map of the regions. (It's worth noting that while there is some overlap, our regions are not the same as NYSSMA Zones, so you may want to check the links if you're not sure who your representative is).

In addition to our beginner band session hosted by our region 9 colleagues, NYSBDA sponsored three other great workshops at the recent NYSSMA winter conference. These included a session by NYSBDA 3rd VP, Dr. Andrew Pease, on the "Magic of Singing" with your ensemble; a session on the importance of professional networking for collegiate students, led by Shoko Nagami, past president of our Syracuse Collegiate Chapter; and rounding things out was a percussion workshop led by Robin Linaberry. Just prior to Robin's session, we also had the great pleasure of presenting him with the NYSBDA Outstanding Retired Band Director Award.

In Shoko Nagami's session at the winter conference she spoke of the importance of professional networking. The idea of professional networking is certainly important to anyone who has been involved with NYSBDA or any other professional association, and has been a particular point of reflection for myself as well this school year. As part of some professional development within our school district, a number of us recently read the book The Innovator's Mindset, by George Couros. In his book he speaks of 8 characteristics of an innovative mindset, one of which is being networked. In this section Couros states, "Innovation (and enjoyment) flourishes when teachers collaborate to learn and practice new strategies. Isolation is often the enemy of innovation."

Many of us know all too well the pitfalls of isolation. The realities of teaching band often mean that you are the only band teacher in your school, perhaps your district. Some of us are not only the band teacher, but the entire music department. In these situations, especially, we should take the time to ensure that we are connected to others who are engaged in the same work we are. It is important to have people to share thoughts and ideas with, and to get thoughts and ideas from.

I encourage all of you to examine your own professional network. In my own life, of all of the professional groups I've been involved with, NYSBDA ranks up there at the top of my go-to networks. The wealth of knowledge and experience held within this group is remarkable, and the willingness to share it even more so. This network of professionals is great because of how involved our members are, and I'm thankful for each of you as we begin the new year.

<u>Trumpet Tips for Everyone</u> Richard DePasquale

A potpourri of trumpet instruction topics to include: 1st year essentials, proper embouchure development, improving note accuracy, 1st and 3rd valve slide use strategies, intonation tendencies, double and triple tonguing, vibrato and transpositions. Also included, an overview of some popular NYSSMA solos, their performance challenges and suggested solutions. Excellent handouts provided!



Richard DePasquale holds a bachelors degree in music education from SUNY Fredonia and a masters degree in general education from Nazareth College. He retired from the Fairport Central School District in June of 2010 after a 35 year career teaching brass instruments and conducting bands at all levels. Under Mr. DePasquale's direction, the Martha Brown Concert Band was a frequent receiver of the highest ratings among all middle school concert bands in New York State at NYSSMA Major Organization Festivals, including a record nine consecutive Level IV Gold w/Distinction ratings.

Mr. DePasquale has enjoyed appointments as a junior high and middle school honor band festival conductor, and has been a frequent presenter at annual conferences sponsored by NYSSMA (New York State School Music Association) and NYSBDA (New York State Band Directors Association), in brass pedagogy and instruction, as well as specialization in providing technology solutions to music educators in the areas of data management, desktop publishing and the development of organizational skills. He resides in Fairport with his wife Susie, also a music educator and church organist, and remains active in music as a member and Assistant Conductor of the Perinton Concert Band, a NYSSMA All-State Brass solo adjudicator, guest conductor, and clinician.

<u>Tune-Up Your Delivery System!</u> <u>Excercises to Enhance Your Musical Leadership</u> Dr. Brian Doyle

This clinic provides us all an opportunity to reflect on how we interact non-verbally with our students, particularly through gesture in rehearsals, and to provide further pathways for mutual growth as we strive for excellence.



Brian K. Doyle joined the Crane School of Music faculty as Director of Bands in 2006. He conducts the Crane Wind Ensemble (CWE) and Symphonic Band, and also teaches courses in conducting. A graduate of Michigan State University (BME, MM), his principal teachers included John Whitwell, Joseph Lulloff and James Forger. Doyle later received the AMusD in Wind Conducting under the mentorship of Michael Haithcock at the University of Michigan. In March, Dr. Doyle was honored by his peers in the profession by being elected into the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. Dr. Doyle's former teaching posts in-

clude faculty positions at Indiana University, The University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill, Duke University, and as a grade 5-12 public school music educator in Imlay City, MI. While in North Carolina, Dr. Doyle served as the resident conductor of the Triangle British Brass Band and performed regularly as saxophonist with the North Carolina Symphony Orchestra.

Friday, 3:45 PM <u>Put A Cork In It!</u> Save time and money by re-corking instruments yourself Miles DeCastro

On the surface, re-corking seems like a simple task. After attempting it on your own once or twice, it may seem like pure witchcraft. In this clinic, I will demystify the process and show you how to decrease repair downtime and repair budget strain by re-corking instruments yourself. We will look at the best ways to re-cork saxophone necks, clarinet/oboe/bassoon tenons, and flute/piccolo head joints. Resources for obtaining re-corking tools and supplies will also be addressed. If time allows, we will look at other places where corks come into play on instruments, such as key feet, valve alignment, water keys, and points of regulation.

Miles DeCastro is the instrument repair technician at The Crane School of Music, State University of New York at Potsdam, where he teaches courses in instrument repair, and is responsible for the repairs, maintenance, and inventory of over 1,000 instruments. In addition to his work at Crane, he owns and operates North Country Winds, a repair shop specializing in artist-level clarinet repairs and USA warranty work for Backun clarinets. Miles has been an active member of the National Association of Professional Band Instrument Repair Technicians since 2007. In that time, he has attended every national conference and will be presenting at his fifth national conference in a row this April. He currently serves as Vice President and Director of Region 1, and in the past has served on the finance committee and has hosted clinics at the regional and national level. On top of all of this, Miles is a Straubinger Certified Technician, Yamaha Certified Sales Professional, graduate of the Yamaha Service Advantage Program, and he has studied instrument repair with Morrie Backun.

Ronald Sutherland retired from the Clarence (NY) Central School District in 1996 after twenty-five years of teaching instrumental music and conducting the Clarence Wind Ensemble. Ron also taught at Williamsville North High School for two years and started his teaching career at Silver Creek Central School in September of 1961. The Clarence High School Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band featured many artists including Vaclav Nelhybel, Karel Husa, Sigurd Rascher, Carl St. Clair, Williams Willet, Donald Schleicher, Frank Erickson, Alan Vizzuti, and Rhythm and Brass. Under Mr. Sutherland's direction, the Clarence Bands toured throughout the Eastern United States and Canada. In 1976, a combined Clarence High School Band participated in an International Youth Festival in Aberdeen, Scotland and London, England. In the summer of 1990, the band toured

and performed in Austria and Italy. In addition to many guest conducting, clinics, consulting, and adjudication appearances, Ron has led many student leadership workshops throughout New York State. Each summer Mr. Sutherland travels to Europe with a select Band and Chorus under the auspices of American Music Abroad. Ron was active in the New York State School Music Association having served as president in 1984-1985. He and his wife Cathy are currently the co-head chaperones for NYSSMA's 900 All-State students at the Winter Conference.

<u>Clinic by</u> Dr. Michael Votta



Dr. Michael Votta has been hailed by critics as "a conductor with the drive and ability to fully relay artistic thoughts" and praised for his "interpretations of definition, precision and most importantly, unmitigated joy." He currently serves as Director of Bands at the University of Maryland where he holds the rank of Professor. Votta has taught conducting seminars in the US and Israel, and has guest conducted and lectured throughout the world with organizations including the Beijing Wind Orchestra, the Prague Conservatory, the Eastman School of Music, the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, the National Arts Camp at Interlochen, the Midwest Clinic and the Conductors Guild. He is the author of numerous articles on wind literature and conducting. Before his appointment at Maryland, Votta held conducting

positions at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Duke University, Ithaca College, the University of South Florida, Miami University (Ohio) and Hope College. Votta holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in Conducting degree from the Eastman School of Music where he served as Assistant Conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble and studied with Donald Hunsberger. A native of Michigan, Votta received his undergraduate training and Master of Music degrees from the University of Michigan, where he studied with H. Robert Reynolds. As a clarinetist, Votta has performed as a soloist throughout the US and Europe.

<u>Developing a Culture of Musicianship,</u> <u>Character, and Excellence in the Secondary Band Program</u> Elizabeth Buell/Corey Riley/ Erin Tapia

This clinic will serve to share specific strategies for developing and sustaining a culture of musicianship, character, and excellence within a secondary band program whose student-musicians are eager to head to the band room to make music together day after day. Session topics will include approaches to creating a band-family of invested musicians, providing inspiring opportunities outside the 42 minute rehearsal, teaching character and musicianship as integrated curricular topics, developing a program focus that values serving the school and wider community through music-making and musical service, setting a high musical standard while supporting all students, improving recruitment and retention via communication and buy-in strategies, and celebrating successes in a way that inspires further program growth.

Elizabeth Buell is a band director at Onondaga Hill Middle School in the Westhill Central School District in Syracuse, New York. A native of Cazenovia, New York, she received her Bachelor of Music Education Degree from the State of New York at Fredonia in 2000 and Master of Music Education Degree from Ithaca College in 2005. Elizabeth is a long-standing member and past board member of the New York State Band Director's Association. Her students are actively involved in Onondaga All-County bands and jazz ensembles, NYSSMA solo and major festivals, regional jazz festivals, and community outreach performances. In 2013, she collaborated with her colleague, Brendan Van Epps, on a supplemental music book titled, *The Rhythm Curriculum*, a method created to systematically teach and reinforce rhythm reading skills to developing musicians. She serves as conductor for the Syracuse University sponsored Honor Band, Poco Allegro, and beginning in 2013, established and co-directs The Westside Summer Band Camp.



Erin Tapia is a public school and private studio instrumental music teacher, performer, clinician, and author. Ms. Tapia is in her sixteenth year teaching in the Westhill Central School District in Syracuse, New York, where she serves as the Westhill High School Director of Bands and conducts the WHS Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Jazz Lab, 50+ student Brazilian Percussion Ensemble, and chamber music ensembles. Ms. Tapia's ensembles have traveled often, including performances throughout New York State and in Chicago, Atlanta, Tampa, Orlando, Boston, Baltimore, and New York City. Her students regularly perform in local and state honor bands and orchestras, and more than fifty of Ms. Tapia's students have performed in collegiate instrumental music ensembles. Ms. Tapia is co-author of "The Sight Reading Book," a

set of 21 sight-reading books carefully aligned with state-specific criteria at six different levels of difficulty. She maintains a private flute studio and performs on flute and piccolo with the Central Winds: Music Educators' Wind Ensemble and the Syracuse Summer Festival Orchestra and holds the position of Personnel Manager of the Central Winds. Ms. Tapia is active as guest conductor and has presented clinics on instrumental pedagogy, music literacy, score study, curriculum, and teaching in the common core era to music educators at County, All-State, State, and National conferences. Ms. Tapia holds bachelor's and master's degrees in Music Education with Performance Honors in Flute from Syracuse University's Setnor School of Music. Ms. Tapia currently resides in Baldwinsville, New York, with her husband, conductor Dr. James Tapia, and their sons, Joshua and Christopher, and daughter, Isabella.



Corey Riley has been teaching music in the public schools since 2010. His experience has primarily been in instrumental music where he has served as a band director in both Ohio and New York. He is currently the Associate Director of Bands at Westhill High School, where he directs the Symphonic Band, the Jazz Ensemble, and teaches brass and percussion lessons grades 6-12. In addition, Mr. Riley teaches music theory and is the advisor of the Westhill High School Audio Engineering and Production Club. In the Summer, he acts as the Assistant Technical Director for the Skaneateles Music Festival. Mr. Riley graduated from The Ohio State University in 2010 with bachelor's degrees in Music Education and Euphonium Performance. He received his master's degree in Instructional Technology from

Syracuse University in 2018. Corey also serves on the New York State Band Director's Association Executive Board as the 2nd Vice President of Membership and the Website Editor. He regularly performs with the Syracuse University Brass Ensemble, Bones East, and the Salt City Tuba Euphonium Quartet.

<u>Clinic by</u> Dr. James Tapia



Dr. James Tapia is music director of the Syracuse Summer Festival Orchestra, conductor of the Central Winds, and conductor of the Syracuse Youth Orchestra. He served the previous four years as associate director of ensembles and held the Donald R. Shepherd Chair in Conducting at the University of Michigan. While in Ann Arbor, he was also the music director/conductor of the renowned Michigan All-State Orchestra and Band. He began his professional conducting experience with the Tampa Bay Symphony as assistant conductor and has conducted the Syracuse Symphony Orchestra, the Austin Bach Festival Orchestra, the Detroit Chamber Winds and Strings,

and the Dallas Wind Symphony along with numerous conducting experiences in the academic arena. He has worked with distinguished conductors and teachers Pierre Boulez, Gustav Meier, Fiora Contino, Louis Lane, Jerry Junkin, and Fred Fennell. Tapia has received praise from composers Leslie Bassett, Michael Daugherty, Karel Husa, Donald Grantham, and Andrew Meade for his insightful interpretations of their works. He maintains an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator.

LIVING LEGEND <u>Creative Conducting</u> Mr. Michael Haithcock

Combining elements of creative philosophy with a practical approach to physical wellness and gestural clarity, this clinic will explore widely held "myths" concerning what it means to be a "good conductor." Discussion will focus on best practices for developing healthy ways to enhance one's physical conducting, methods of applying score study to gestural clarity, and the balance of engaging students in the creative use of both objective musical awareness and subjective musical possibilities.



Michael Haithcock assumed his duties as director of bands and professor of music (Conducting) at the University of Michigan in the fall of 2001 after twenty-three years on the faculty of Baylor University. Following in the footsteps of William D. Revelli and H. Robert Reynolds, Professor Haithcock conducts the internationally renowned University of Michigan Symphony Band, guides the acclaimed band and wind ensemble graduate conducting program, and provides administrative leadership for all aspects of the University of Michigan's diverse and historic band program. In February of 2012, he was named an Arthur F. Thurnau Professor by the University of Michigan which is the University's highest award for excellence in undergraduate teaching.

Ensembles under Haithcock's guidance have received a wide array of critical acclaim for their high artistic standards of performance and repertoire. These accolades have come through concerts reviews at national and state conventions, performances in major concert venues such as Carnegie Hall in New York City, Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles, and a variety of performances presented during the Symphony Band's May 2011 tour of China, as well as recordings on the Albany, Arsis, and Equilibrium labels.

NYSBDA Region 1 Review Dr. Mary Land and more Thursday, October 18, 2018 Richard Goss- Region 1 Representative

Fifty area band directors attended the 7th Annual NYSBDA (Region 1) Regional Workshop held on Thursday, October 18, 2018 at Frontier Middle School (Hamburg, NY).



Dr. Mary Land, professor at Western Michigan University, and a member of the Midwest Clinic Board of Directors, was our headliner. She gave a keynote presentation, The Music Connection, showing how music creates unique and lasting connections in both our personal and professional lives. Next, Mary rehearsed the Frontier Middle School 8th Grade Band, directed by event host Todd Macon. Dr. Land emphasized efficiency in conducting, warm-up skills, and



effective communication of rehearsal discipline concepts (say "eyes" to refocus students instead of long lecture). In the afternoon, Dr. Land provided insight into literature and podium skills to three band directors while they conducted the Region 1 Directors' Band (utilizing middle school literature by Giroux, Ticheli & Strommen) during our annual conducting workshop. Dr. Land's knowledge, pleasant demeanor and

approachable personality set a positive tone for the day.



Other clinic presenters included Region 1 NYSBDA members, who presented instrument-specific workshops: Craig Poissant (Grand Island) on Classical Saxophone Tone, Evonne Michel (Williamsville), A Comprehensive Guide to Euphonium, and Mary Kay Ortolano (Frontier), her always entertaining and informative Double Reed Clinic.
