1:15- 2:15	The Process Continues: Developing Proficiency of Fundamentals is the Key	Martin Allen, Sarah Russo, and the Grand Island High School Wind Ensemble Convention Center BCD	Fundamentals and the proficiency of those fundamentals can make a profound improvement in a student's individual musicianship and ability to comprehend and perform music. This clinic is an example of Grand Island's use of a strategic lesson curriculum. We hope to share our step by step approach to developing high school band students into independent musicians. The Grand Island Wind Ensemble will help demonstrate the techniques used to develop the fluency of these fundamentals.	Martin Allen has taught instrumental music in the Grand Island Schools for thirty-two years. After four years at the elementary level, Mr. Allen is in his twenty eighth year at the high school. Under his baton, Grand Island High School Ensembles have been recognized for their excellence at State and National Music Festivals, including performances at NYSBDA, NYSSMA, and MENC All Eastern Conventions. Sarah Russo has taught instrumental music in the Grand Island schools for 22 years. In recognition of her work at the middle school, she was recognized with the PTA Honorary Lifetime Membership. She co-directs the middle school musical and holds her iTheatrics level 1 certification.

2:30- 3:30	Beating the Blowout: A Recipe for Overcoming Soft Palate Fatigue.	Dr. Julianne Kirk Doyle Onondaga Room FGH	Have you or your students experienced fatigue to the point they can no longer play? Often called "Blowout?" Woodwind and Brass musicians experience soft palatal collapse and are unaware it is the cause of their fatigue. Learn about the soft palate air leak which can be a major road block for young players. In this presentation you will learn how to identify the warning signs and gain strategies for strengthening playing fundamentals to "banish the blowout."	Julianne Kirk Doyle is Professor of Clarinet and Director of Crane Youth Music at the Crane School of Music. An active soloist and chamber musician, Dr. Doyle performs regularly with the Aria Reed Trio, Northern Symphonic Winds and Orchestra of Northern New York. She holds the DMA and MM degrees in Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of Music and a Bachelors of Music from the University of Oklahoma. Her primary teachers include Jon Manasse, David Etheridge and Bradford Behn. She is an artist with Backun Musical Services and DANSR/Vandoren.

The concert/clinic includes performances of standard repertoire, a band piece learned entirely by ear, several student compositions for band, and a composition by the director. Discussion will focus on creating a culture of student composition within the framework of a traditional band program. Students will speak about their composition processes, and what it's like to perform their friend's pieces.	Since 1993, Stephen Shewan has been a music teacher at Williamsville East High School in East Amherst, New York. Shewan has composed music for numerous media, including orchestra, string quartet, chamber ensembles, symphonic band, solo voice, choir and piano. Hismusic has been performed by bands, choirs, orchestras, chamber ensembles and soloists across the world. Every year, each student in the Williamsville East Bands composes at least one piece. This program was spotlighted in the November 2019 issue of the Instrumentalist magazine. East student composers are consistently featured at Young Composers Honors Concerts in New York State and at the national level.

Matthew describes how he first came to terms with Symphony No. 10 and then taking it to the finish line. Music is a powerful force for transformation. The process of finishing the piece helped Matthew deal with the grief of losing his father and provided unexpected gifts.	Matthew Maslanka is a clinician, publisher, music engraver, performer, and composer. Matthew is the foremost authority on his father David Maslanka's music and is in demand as a clinician and educator worldwide. He publishes his father's music through Maslanka Press and heads the David Maslanka Foundation. As a music engraver and copyist, he regularly works on such hit films and video games as Shazam!, The Incredibles 2, and Star Wars: The Old Republic. With performance degrees from Michigan State University and Indiana University, he has performed as a euphoniumist and trombonist on Broadway's Fiddler on the Roof and with New York's Chelsea Symphony.
