

The 2024 NYSBDA Symposium *Building Community Through Band* was an amazing weekend. The snow on Thursday melted by Friday and attendees and the honor bands descended on Syracuse. Thank you to the NYSBDA Executive Board, Region Representatives and members for all of the assistance during the symposium. The band directors in New York State are a community willing to support and share best practices. The success of the symposium is the strength of the membership. Thank you for scheduling time in your busy schedules to expand your horizons and learn.

During our time together we explored director self-care, instructional strategies, quality repertoire and space for student voice. Ideas on how to build community and ideas that could be implemented in your classroom and rehearsals immediately. This started on Friday with the session **Balancing Pedagogy** with Practice: Experiences of Middle School Band Directors, Dr. Lauren Diaz, Hofstra University, clinician. Dr. Diaz shared tools and techniques that create opportunities to develop our ensembles using sound pedagogical practices in a performance based setting. The emphasis was on nurturing the students to be prepared for the expectations of high school, providing activities and engagement for their growth and musical development that was relevant to their experiences.

Way Back "Wind-Band-sday", Mr Matthew Cool and Mrs. Marni Conte, the conductors of the Williamsville South Wind Ensemble, presented an amazing performance clinic which highlighted the growth of the students' voice in the ensemble. What started as a way to assess the plethora of literature in their music library, evolved into a student driven discussion and evaluation of music, performance technique, insight into composers, ideas surrounding the music and so much more. Through this process, the students engaged in sight reading the literature, developed their musicianship skills and critical thinking skills to evaluate each composition. This initiative is now a staple in the ensemble's yearly activities.

For percussionists and non-percussionists, Improve and Empower Your Percussion Section: Technical Depth and Resources for All Standard Percussion Instruments, with Mr. Brandon Bromsey, clinician, provided insight to develop technical consistencies that apply across the entire percussion section. Brandon provided resources and demonstrations for developing percussionists at all levels. An emphasis was on well-rounded percussionists working with students on non-pitched, mallet instruments and timpani. At the end of the session Brandon engaged with the participants and demonstrated various techniques on the timpani.

Dr. Marcia Bornhurst Parkes, clinician and NYSBDA founding member, clinic **Create and Connect: Ideas** and **Strategies for Building Community in Band** shared a wealth of knowledge and life experiences which shaped her teaching and engagement in the classroom. The successes in her classrooms and ensembles were the direct result of intentional planning to create opportunities for students and the school community. Dr. Bornhurst Parkes reminded us that community is built by "knowing your band members personalities and interests, supporting their academic and musical potential and providing a safe space for their hopes and dreams".

And yet, even if opportunities are created and students are engaged, they sometimes still leave our programs. There is quality instruction, supportive space and positive intentions, and for different reasons, students may choose to not participate. In **The Exit Interview: Attrition in the Band Program and How We Respond**, clinician Mrs. Elizabeth Buell shared practical tips and suggestions to help students find their own path. If students decide to leave the program, Mrs. Buell engages the student in a conversation. She implored how it is essential to continue to build a relationship with the student. This "interview" is an opportunity to find out the reasons, discuss what might be most beneficial for the student and assist them in the decision making process. It gives voice to the student and fosters a relationship, even if that student does not remain in the program. Hearing from the student, allows the teacher to also reflect and address any bias or concerns that can be addressed.

Put a Cork in it! did not disappoint. Mr. Miles DeCastro, instrument repair technician at The Crane School of Music, State University of New York at Potsdam, brought his knowledge of instrument repair, his great personality and ability to demystify the process of re-corking instruments. Miles shared quick and efficient technique to re-cork a clarinet and a saxophone neck. From how to "squeeze or beat the pith" out of a sheet of cork with a rawhide mallet, to measurements, using duckbill pliers and sandpaper to get the cork just right. Contact cement was also highly recommended, especially if you could not afford the hot air tool. Attendees left feeling a sense of awe at how easy Miles demonstrated the repairs and gained confidence in their ability to tackle a cork repair.

Friday evening was filled with energy from the **Bear Mountain Brass Band**. This nine piece brass band played traditional jazz and blues songs as well as arrangements of modern rock and pop songs in the style of a New Orleans marching/brass band. NYSBDA very own Jazz Honor Band Chair, Mr. Austin Day is a member. His tenor saxophone chops are truly impressive. The audience was thrilled to hear the band and their soloists. The music was amazing and the band members had the audience on their feet.

Saturday kicked off with self-care with **Healthy Conducting- Back to Basics**, Dr. Shayna Stahl, University of Kentucky, clinician. Dr. Stahl got us up and moving, finding our way back to the basics and analyzing our conducting movements. Guiding our movements and drawing attention to areas of tense muscles helped identify what each individual needed to address. This reflection will help promote healthy and long-lasting conducting careers. Our daily obligations often get our attention and time. Dr. Stahl reminded us to start the day to remember to focus on our well-being.

How to Organize A Successful Band Council continued with "student voice" in the music program. Mr. Phil Aguglia builds community in his band, engaging students to take on responsibilities and ownership of the ensemble. Phil shared a well organized action plan which motivates student leaders. The session shared a plan from the advisors position, ensembles action plan, student executive team and the outline of events throughout the year.

Dr. Jennifer Greene, conductor, and the Binghamton University Wind Symphony, started the first day of their spring break sharing their experiences in, **Is there Life After High School Band?** This performance clinic highlighted the repertoire which included, *Legends of the Galaxy, A Cosmic Fanfare* by Chandler Wilson, *Fate of the Gods* by Steven Reineke, and *Star Ship* by Yukiko Nishimura. The student musicians then shared some of their stories, what brought them to BU, how continuing with music was essential to their lives and how remaining an active participant in music will continue to shape their futures.

During Clarinet Essentials-Foundations for a Flourishing Clarinet Section, Dr. Julianne Kirk Doyle, clinician, shared tips and tricks to train a FUNdamentally engaged clarinet section! At any age it's always beneficial to focus on the basics; posture, hand position, tone production, sound initiation, articulation, embouchure, tongue position, intonation and finger fluency. Dr. Doyle demonstrated with some of her students from Crane who made the trip to share in the session. Working with the students was a great way to let participants see how she works to build strong sections with a focus on technical skills. Dr. Doyle reminded us that students who experience success on many levels flourish in your ensemble.

A highlight of the symposium continues to be the NYSBDA Middle School, High School and Jazz Honor Bands. In addition to rehearsal times, the students attended a leadership workshop with Mr. Sutherland. Mr. Sutherland engages students to understand their roles in creating positive musical experiences in their ensembles. The Middle School Honor Band, under the direction of Dr. Cheldon Williams, performed on Saturday. The High School Honor Jazz Band, under the direction of Mr. Dennis Mackrel, performed on Sunday followed by the High School Honor Band, under the direction of Dr. Shayna Stahl.

NYSBDA at the Collegiate Level is flourishing. Mr. Aiden Carney, C-NYSBDA President, clinician, and a panel of past and present C-NYSBDA executive board members, including Victoria Cusumano and Julie Williams shared pathways to collegiate NYSBDA membership. The session shared organizational ideas, planning events and networking. The NYSBDA collegiate chapters are strong and work together to build the band community across the state. The Saturday evening concert showcased the **Crane Wind Ensemble** with conductor Dr. Brian Doyle. The performance included newer diversity-oriented works by composers from our lifetime. The audience, which included the honor band students, was exposed to a variety of band literature that expanded the listeners' experience. Here is a link to the <u>Concert Program and Notes</u>.

NYSBDA membership was honored to have **Dr. Matthew Arau**, as the 2024 NYSBDA Symposium Keynote Speaker. During his clinic session, *Edge of Your Seat Rehearsals*. *Engaging All Students Always*, Dr. Arau shared strategies for engaging students to collaborate and lead, essentially becoming part of the community. Understanding the who, why, how and what of rehearsing will provide the foundation for a dynamic rehearsal experience. Create an environment which is well paced, with purpose, have students responsible for their ensemble, engage students in singing, moving, listening, change things up, use positive language, and provide quality repertoire. As teachers, we need to take care of ourselves, be prepared and value each student. In his Keynote, *Making JOY Your Tonal Center – The 6 Keys to Fulfillment and Wellbeing in Teaching, Music Making, and Life*, shared "six keys to keep the joy alive in teaching while centering our personal wellbeing, sense of worth, and true power to make a transformative difference in the lives of our students." Unlocking JOY involves gratitude, contribution, purpose, care, communication and community. Students need to feel valued in our classrooms. Every student can contribute no matter what their level of musicianship. Collaborating with students on the vision and goal of the ensemble will build community. In the community you build, students will have a safe space to learn and grow and take risks. Communication creates connections with students on many levels. The conducting clinic with Dr. Ticheli featured the following selections; *Grainger: Irish Tune from County Derry, Ticheli: Amazing Grace, Joy Revisited, and Cajun Folk Songs, mvt. 2 (Belle).*

The ensemble was composed of the symposium attendees, as you can believe, the ensemble was large and well balanced. Each conductor had the opportunity to conduct the ensemble and work with Dr. Ticheli. The interaction of the conductors, ensembles and Dr. Ticheli was great to experience. Following the conducting session, the ensemble was thrilled to have Dr. Ticheli to conduct *Joy Revisited*. CSI Northeast in Ithaca, NY August 13-15, 2024



Tim Lautzenheiser



Tim Lautzenheiser serves as Senior Vice President of Education for Conn Selmer, Inc. His career spans ten years of college band directing at Northern Michigan University, the University of Missouri, and New Mexico State University. After serving as Executive Director of Bands of America, he created Attitude Concepts, Inc. to accommodate the many requests for student leadership workshops, convention speaking and professional development presentations for educators. Tim's books, produced by G.I.A. Publications, are best-sellers in the music profession. He is also co-author of Hall Leonard's popular band method, Essential Elements.

Paula Crider

Paula A. Crider, Professor Emerita, The University of Texas, is an internationally recognized guest conductor, lecturer, clinician and adjudicator. She has enjoyed engagements in 47 states and 9 foreign countries. Dr. Crider is Past President of the National Band Association and The American Bandmasters' Association. She serves as Senior Educational Consultant for Conn-Selmer, Inc., has served as Director of Music for the London's New Years Day Parade, and serves on the Board of Directors for the Midwest Clinic. Awards and honors include: The Distinguished Service to Music Award, two "Eyes of Texas" Awards for distinguished teaching, Phi Beta Mu International Hall of Fame, the Sudler Legion of Merit, Texas Bandmaster of the Year, and the Midwest Medal of Honor.



Beth A. Fabrizio



Beth A. Fabrizio holds a Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music in Clarinet Performance and a Master of Music in Conducting, Education and Performance from Ithaca College. She has studied conducting with Rodney Winther and Dr. Donald Hunsberger and Clarinet with Michael Webster, Richard Waller, Stanley Hasty, William Osseck, Carmine Campione and performed in master classes with Richard Stoltzman.

Ms. Fabrizio maintains a private clarinet studio with numerous students pursuing careers in music education, therapy, recording and performance. She herself performed as the principal clarinetist and personnel manager with The Greater Rochester Music Educators Wind

Ensemble, and former Eb clarinet with The Perinton Concert Band. Beth is a freelance performer and is an active artist/ clinician for The D'Addario Corporation and educational clinician with the Conn-Selmer Corporation. She has just recently retired after 36 years as a public-school educator, and most recently from The Hilton Central School District as a director of Bands at Village Elementary. Beth is also presenting educational clinics and workshops thru Fabrizio's Musical Concepts. Ms. Fabrizio is a charter member of the 2022 Chi Chapter in New York State of Phi Beta Mu Fraternity and its current President.

Ms. Fabrizio has conducted various honor bands and given master classes and clinics across the United States, Europe and Asia. She has taught marching bands and drum and bugle corps for over thirty years. Ms. Fabrizio has been the brass caption head with The Carolina Crown Drum and Bugle Corps, brass coordinator with The Pride of Soka from Tokyo, Japan, brass staff with Boston Crusaders, The Glassmen and Spirit of Atlanta. Beth adjudicates for DCI, WGI, BOA and numerous other state associations.

Daniel Cook



Daniel Cook is delighted to be joining the Ithaca College community as Director of Bands and Conductor of the historic Ithaca College Wind Ensemble. He comes to IC from the University of North Texas faculty, where he conducts the Wind Ensemble, teaches courses in wind band literature, graduate and undergraduate conducting, and serves as Director of Athletic Bands. In this capacity, he is proud to lead the 435-member Green Brigade Marching Band. Cook earned Doctor of Musical Arts with program honors and Master of Music degrees in conducting from Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, where he studied with Dr. Mallory Thompson. He graduated magna cum laude with the Bachelor of Music degree in music education from the University of Georgia

in Athens. There, he was also recognized as a Theodore Presser Scholar. Cook's ensemble performances have received acclaim, most recently by such composers as Bryant, Daugherty, Del Tredici, Gotkovsky, Higdon, and Schwantner. Ensembles under his direction have performed at the Florida and Texas state music conferences, Bands of America events, the Texas UIL State contest, as well as at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival. The UNT Wind Ensemble has won first-place recognition for the collegiate American Prize in Wind Ensemble Performance. In addition to his work at UNT, Cook is honored to have held educational positions with the award-winning Dallas Brass Band and Santa Clara Vanguard.

Cook is an active clinician, adjudicator, speaker, and guest conductor. His lecture interests focus on the adaptation of trends in positive psychology to enhance the efficacy of music classroom instruction, and he has delivered talks regarding these topics at state conventions, band director association gatherings, and at the Midwest Clinic. Cook has also participated in prestigious masterclasses, such as the inaugural Reynolds Conducting Institute at the Midwest Clinic, and as a winner/invited conductor for the Young Conductor/Mentor Project sponsored by the National Band Association. He is published in the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series.

Prior to graduate work, Cook began his career as a public-school band director in Florida, and ensembles under his direction received accolades for their achievements. He was a member of

the Florida Bandmasters Association and chaired numerous concert and marching band events. Additionally, Cook served as staff pianist and organist at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Daytona Beach.

His current professional affiliations include the Collegiate Band Directors National Association, National Association, National Band Association, New York State School Music Association, Kappa Kappa Psi, and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia

Erin Cole Steele is the Director of the Division of Education and Senior Educational Consultant for Conn Selmer, Inc. Prior to joining Conn Selmer, Erin had a successful career as the Director of Bands at Tapp Middle School in Cobb County Georgia for 22 years. Under her leadership, the Tapp Band had many honors included being selected to perform at the 58th annual Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago, Illinois in December of 2004. Aaron S. Burgess is a dynamic conductor and music educator with close ties to the collegiate, public school, and community music arenas. Mr. Burgess is assistant professor of music education at Ithaca College where he teaches courses in instrumental music
